It's official. UNISON members in Local Government in England, Wales and Northern Ireland have voted yes to industrial action over this years pay claim. Members voted by 55% to 45% to take industrial action because the employers are asking them to take a pay cut. Again.

There will be two days of strike action on the 16 and 17 July, designed to bring the employers back to reality and back to negotiations. This industrial action will affect all City Council services, but we are not alone in taking action. UNITE (formerly the Transport and General Workers Union) will also be on strike on these days.

The Branch is holding meetings in work places with members from across the Council, explaining why we have been forced to take action and how we are going to make the strike effective. The Branch is organising pickets at all council offices for both days of action, and as ever, we need everyone's help to make the action successful. There's plenty of work to do; from recruiting new members to picketing and keeping staff and the public informed. If you want to get more involved, please contact your local steward or the Branch Office immediately.

No one likes going on strike - we've all got plenty of work on and would much prefer getting on with trying to deliver excellent public services - but local government workers have suffered years of below inflation pay settlements. Enough is enough. Lets make this two day action a success so our hard work is properly rewarded.

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STRIKE FOR FAIR PAY

This month promises to be a crucial one for UNISON members up and down the country. Nearly 600,000 members will be taking strike action on 16th and 17th July to force the employers to make an improved pay offer.

However, UNISON members have had enough of poverty pay. At a time when our household bills are going through the roof, the employers' paltry, below inflation offer of just 2.45% is simply not good enough.

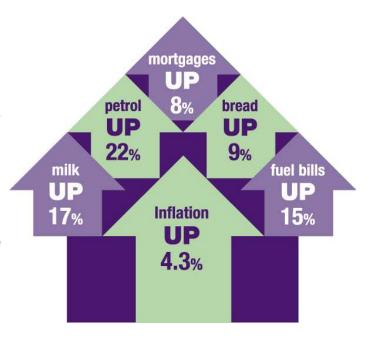

Key facts:

- The Local Government Employers say 2.45% is the limit of affordability, but have never justified their statement.
- That didn't stop them making efficiency savings of £1 billion more than the government required last year.
- The offer is too low and represents a pay cut for members (CPI is 3.3%, RPI 4.3%)
- The lowest paid spend most of their pay on bills. Food costs are rising by 20%, gas and electricity by 15% and petrol by 22% (with more rises to come)
- The government's pay policy of keeping increases within 2% is wrong, and hits women (75% of the local government workforce) hardest.



- Local government workers don't cause inflation. The government's own office for national statistics says recent inflation rises have been caused by increased housing costs and higher food, petrol and oil prices – not public sector pay.
- 250,000 local government workers are paid below £6.50 an hour
- 57% of workers in local government earn less than £15,825 pa – that's £8,175 less that the median average full time salary across the economy of £24,000.
- If we accept the current offer it will mean that we have had below inflation pay rises for the last 4 years – and it gets worse: the government has indicated that it wants to peg pay rises to just 2% for the next two years as well.
- The employers will not budge without us taking strike action – that's why members have decided in a ballot to take strike action now – we cannot afford for our pay to continually fall behind the rise in the cost of living
- A lot of people will, rightly, feel uncomfortable taking 2 days strike action. We fully understand that people don't want to lose money by going on strike. But the simple fact is – in real terms we're losing money now



- This branch has always been really solid in the past when we've been forced to take action. In the pensions dispute 2 years ago we had the highest percentage of employees out on strike of any council in the country
- We need UNISON members in Manchester to be just as solid this time. We need to shut every council building on 16 and 17 July – it really is the only chance we've got of seeing a decent pay rise.
- Local government workers have suffered 10 years of below inflation settlements. No wonder there are recruitment shortages. Over 70% of councils can't recruit social workers.
