Many happy returns... The National Minimum Wage is 10 years old!

he 10th anniversary of the introduction of the National Minimum Wage fell on 1 April this year. Employees in more than one million jobs have benefited, two-thirds of them women. Despite the fears of critics who predicted that a minimum wage would cause catastrophe, it has in fact been positively beneficial by helping to balance the economy and by providing a floor for wage rates, ensuring that many low paid workers have indirectly felt its value push their wages up too. It's also raised the living standards of the lowest paid, and helped close the gap between men and women's pay.

UNISON was a prime mover behind the introduction of the national minimum wage, and is still at the forefront of campaians to strengthen it. Calling recently for the minimum wage to be raised to £7.45 an hour by October 2010, UNISON general secretary Dave Prentis commented: "Fairness should be fundamental as the impact of the recession hits home. The government has stepped in and bailed out the bankers who got us into this mess. But people at the bottom of the ladder - those working on the minimum wage - also need a helping hand to cope."

Campaigning to keep the LGPS

NISON will be launching a major campaign shortly to counter the hostile propaganda coming from David Cameron and Eric Pickles on behalf of the Conservative Party. Both insist that the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) is unsustainable in the long-term and should become a defined contribution scheme – not a defined benefit scheme as at present. Their view is that there is "pensions apartheid" between private and public sector pensions and that the taxpayer should not be asked to fund the LGPS and other public sector schemes.

UNISON will be telling them that the LGPS is a public good, not a drain on public finances. And wouldn't it be a nobler thing for politicians to work to level pensions up and improve private sector pensions, rather than eroding standards down?
